- Poor expectation of Health
- Poor understanding of risk

2016 Workers



- Higher health expectation
- Greater understanding of risk
 - Acute Risk
 - Chronic Risk

 Aim is to protect the physical and mental health of employees by ensuring their continual welfare in their workplace

- Health -v- SafetyS A F E 7
- Duty to manage both <u>Health</u> and Safety
- Most diseases caused by Work activities don't kill but cause years of suffering

Greater cost to the economy

SAFET



- Legislation
 - Employer
 - Employee
- Enforcement
 - Self regulating
- Driven by Insurance
- Contract v's Employees (risk transfer)

Problem



- Health risks may not be understood or a direct cause established
- Don't tend to have the same urgency as Safety Risk
- Slow motion
- Extent of occupational ill health may not be fully understood or the extent of injury known

- Machinery design AFET
 - Adjustment of seating position
- Maintenance
 - Awkward body postures
- Manual Handling
 - Pulling lifting loads

Silica and lung Disease



- General dust exposure
- Silica
 - Silicosis
 - Varying levels of silica in rock
 - Irreversible disease
 - Cancer

Vibration



- Hand arm vibration A F E / _
 - Hand tools

- Whole body vibration
 - Rough Terrain
 - Vehicles

- Machinery
 - Crushers
 - Mills

- Waste chemicals




Managing the risk

Control Measures



- Hierarchy of Control A F E >
 - Elimination
 - Engineering
 - Administrative
 - Personal Protective Equipment
- Dust
 - Extraction
 - Water
 - Masks
- Housekeeping
 - Secondary exposures

Exposure Monitoring



- Sampling and exposure monitoring should be undertaken to determine the extent of the hazard
- Compared against OELV (OEL's)
- Dusts
- Fumes
- Noise & Vibration
- Chemicals

Skin Exposures



- Dermatitis
- Oils and Greases
- Other chemicals
- Control
 - PPE
 - Hand hygiene and care
- Education of Workers

Health Surveillance



- "Where the results of risk assessment show it to be necessary"
- Identifiable disease
- What is Health Surveillance
 - A system to monitor for early signs of ill health so as to prevent further harm occuring
